Register in the spring

Spring Registration 2008, March 17-May 23

Troop leaders and Girl Scout families who participate in Spring Registration keep girls in Girl Scouting another year where their growth and development can continue. Girls will also enjoy another year of wonderful program opportunities, camping fun and much more.



What's new for spring 2008

After conducting several volunteer forums, the council revised the membership registration form. The new forms were tested in several counties for the past two years and proved to be very successful. The membership registration form was combined with the Annual Fund donation form to make the registration and donation process more convenient for Girl Scout families.

The new membership forms have a designated area for parents to make an Annual Fund donation. The troop leader, or designee, will ask parents to make a contribution while completing the membership form. Parents will have the option to write one check or to use their credit card (Visa, MasterCard or American Express) for both membership dues and their Annual Fund donation.

Spring Registration incentive program

Spring Registration is an incentive-based program that rewards troop leaders and girls who participate. All existing troops and individual members who return to Girl Scouts for the 2008-09 membership year are eligible to participate. Girls who participate in Spring Registration can earn a segment patch. The patch is exclusive to girls participating in Spring Registration and is not available for sale at the Badge & Sash stores.

This is the second year for the segment patch incentive program and girls who participate in Spring Registration this year will receive the second segment, Confidence 2009.

Troop leaders who meet the guidelines listed below will receive a special tote bag. To receive the troop leader incentive, leaders must:

- Submit their troop's registration by the May 23 deadline
- Register a minimum of five girls (three girls if an older girl troop)
- Turn in Annual Fund contributions from at least five families

Troop leaders will receive a Spring Registration packet of materials at the March service unit meeting. The packet includes new form instructions. Contact the council office at (404) 527-7592 with Spring Registration questions.

Cookie program updates

Home show teams up with Girl Scouts



Eight teams of girls in grades nine-12 were chosen to participate in our first architectural build at the Atlanta Home Show, March 13-16.

Paired with local engineers and architects, girls will build anything from animals to sports cars using empty Girl Scout cookie boxes as their base material. Teams will be put to the test as they challenge their math, communication, analytical and leadership skills to complete their projects. In addition to the girls' cookie box models, Girl Scout cookies will be for sale at the home show.

Customers can purchase cookies from a specially designed house made of boxes of Girl Scout Cookies. Patrons at the home show will be encouraged to dismantle the house by purchasing the cookies and will have the option of donating their purchases to U.S. troops. The donated cookies will be given to the USO to distribute to military personnel traveling through Atlanta Hartsfield-Jackson International Airport. Take your cookies to the street

Booth sales may begin Wednesday, March 5 and are an excellent way to add to both troop and girl cookie program goals. Prepare early for a safe and successful experience. Here's how:

- Contact your selected site(s) and get a signed Booth Sale Permission Slip from each booth sale location.
- Ask parents to commit to helping at the booth sale(s).
- Schedule girls to staff the booth so that all girls have a chance to participate.
- Read about booth sales in Safety-Wise. Discuss safety with the girls. Even with permission to use a site, girls should always stay at least 50 feet away from traffic.
- Prepare for the booth sale by making sure the girls are comfortable asking customers to purchase cookies.
- Make decorations, posters, signs or displays for your booth sale. Customers like to see to girls involved in the Girl Scout experience.

Advertise your cookie booth

Troops may post booth sale information on the council's Web site by submitting the details to Sarnethia Wilkinson at swilkinson@girlscoutsnwga.org. The following information is required: Date of the booth sale, times the troop will be at the booth and the exact location of the booth sale including city and street address.

Can't find a booth sale location?

Try conducting a door-to-door sale. Pack up your cases of cookies in a parent's or leader's car. Take the girls to a safe neighborhood and follow along as the girls go door to door with cookies in hand. Most customers still prefer to have a Girl Scout come to their door. This traveling booth sale is a perfect alternative because customers do not have to wait for their cookies – they can purchase them on the spot.

Encourage girls to continue taking orders, using the Extended Order Form, after their initial orders are turned in to the troop cookie manager. These orders can be filled from the extra cases the troop ordered or with cookies from one of the cookie warehouses. To request cookies from a warehouse, the troop cookie manager must contact the service unit cookie manager. The service unit cookie manager is responsible for placing warehouse orders with an area cookie coordinator.

Extra, extra!

Special drawing

All eligible girls who sell a minimum of 175 boxes will be entered in a special drawing for one of several exciting items. Log on to www.girlscoutsnwga.org/cookiesprogram for the details. This is another good reason for girls to continue selling during the extend order taking period.

Encourage girls to submit as many orders as possible by Wednesday, Feb. 6. All girls turning in an order card for 200 or more boxes will receive a special Star Performer patch pin. Keep those cookie orders coming!



New, sell 1,000 boxes

All girls who sell a minimum of 1,000 boxes of Girl Scout Cookies will become members of a special cookie club. These girls will be invited to attend a special celebration where they will be recognized for their achievement in cookie sales.

Your money matters

Troop cookie managers can help ensure a problem-free

cookie program by establishing frequent times for parents to turn in money and utilizing careful and accurate record keeping practices. Remember:



- Only give cookies to girls for whom you have a signed Parent Permission and Responsibility Form.
- Record all transactions on the troop cookie manager's organizer and worksheet.
- Each girl's parent/guardian must sign for all cookies received.
- Make arrangements to collect money one week after girls receive their cookies. This is a good way to spot potential problems.
- It is best not to issue additional cookies to a girl until her initial order is paid for.
- Notify service unit cookie manager early if a troop has an excess of cookies that it might have trouble selling.
- Collect final payment from girls by Tuesday, March 18.
- Parents still owing money after the deadline should be informed that this is a serious financial obligation and collection of all money due will be pursued.
- Work closely with any family still selling and turning in money after the deadline. Notify the service unit cookie manager of the situation and ask if there are troops in the service unit looking for additional cookies to sell.

Service unit directors and troop leaders can support troop cookie managers by:

- Encouraging accurate record keeping. All transactions of cookies and/or money should be recorded accurately. Parent Permission and Responsibility forms should be retained for future use if needed.
- Reminding troop cookie managers of deposit procedures. Personal checks are NOT deposited into the council's bank account. Only troop checks are acceptable. Troops must use the four-part deposit tickets provided by the council. A troop number must be on each deposit ticket. All deposits must be validated by the bank (no night deposits). Only the amount due council should be deposited.
- Contacting parents who still owe money. Often contact by a third party will help with outstanding balances. Leaders may ask the service unit cookie manager to write a letter to parents with outstanding balances.
- Maintaining continuous communications with the troop cookie managers. Leaders and service unit directors should be aware of the status of the troop's cookie program at all times.
- Reminding troop cookie managers of council collection procedures. Troops with parents who owe money at the

conclusion of the cookie program can request assistance with collections. For help, troops should submit a copy of the signed Parent Permission and Responsibility Form and troop worksheet, including amount owed, to the product sales manager as soon as possible. The product sales manager will attempt to collect the outstanding balance by submitting information to a nationwide collection agency to collect on the troop's behalf.

- Encouraging troop cookie managers to meet deadlines. Only troops with all paperwork and money turned in on time and having a per girl average of 175 boxes are eligible for the \$175 bonus. Last year, more than 700 troops earned this bonus.

Register for fall/winter troop camping

Registration for fall/winter (September 2008-February 2009) troop camping at the five council camps begins Tuesday, April 1. Applications will be accepted until all spaces are filled. Troops may camp once during September-November and once again December-February.



To apply for a troop camping space, fill out a Troop Camping Application and have it signed by the troop's service unit director. Troop camping applications are available through service unit directors or on the council Web site at www.girlscoutsnwga.org under Camping & Outdoor Activities. Volunteer trainers needed

Some travel throughout our 20 counties to train while others stay within a county or specific area. All are enthusiastic about teaching adults how to make Girl Scouting the best experience possible for girls.
